



journey through law school, and his latest novel, *Queen of Memphis*.


Hegwood, a Mississippi native and government attorney, captivated the audience with stories of his time at the University of Mississippi School of Law, where he studied alongside best-



This event happens every year, but this year's clean-up is extra special. Keep America Beautiful wants to celebrate the 250th anniversary of our country by clearing 25 billion pieces of litter from public areas.

For February's presentation, the Garden Club welcomed renowned Felder Rushing, recently back from



England, to talk with us about winter gardening.

Central Mississippi blesses us with the climate to grow many beautiful things in the winter, which are rarely collected in one seasonal spot for enjoyment in the cold. Here are some wonderful plants which require little maintenance and provide winter cheer: winter honeysuckle (fragrantissima), camellias, star and Japanese magnolias, sweet olive, winter jasmine, sedum, hellebores, roman hyacinth, rosemary, iris foliage, and of course, narcissus.

The earliest narcissus bloomers are Lent Lily, paperwhites and jonquils. Cool season vegetables can also double as interesting garden visuals.

Cold hardy peas, lettuces and herbs can be planted in beds, pots and borders to attract the eye with greens, purples and yellows. Then, they can easily be harvested for salad, too.

Felder reduces plant arrangement designs to a simple rule: combine "spiky, bushy, frilly and floppy." As always, Felder encourages all types of gardening, from folk to fancy. Buy a pretty pot or use an old colander, as long as you enjoy the result; it's gardening. Often, what we need is all around us.

In March, the Garden Club will meet at the Kline Farm for a program by Emily Stewart. Guests can join any monthly program with an invitation from a member.

# Canton Board of Aldermen addresses infrastructure and community initiatives at February meeting

The Canton Board of Aldermen held its regular meeting on February 18 at Canton City Hall, where key issues related to infrastructure, community events and future projects were discussed and voted on.

Mayor William Truly, Jr. called the meeting to order, followed by an invocation and roll call. Present at the meeting were Aldermen Markee Blount, Rodriquez Brown, Fred Esco Jr., Les Penn, Tim C. Taylor, Lafayette E. Wales, and Alderwoman Monica Gilkey.

The Board adopted the agenda before welcoming a series of presenters. Corey Tate and Brooks Edward from ENT, LLC, along with Comelia Walker, Demetra Stewart, Iveanna Murry, Canton Tourism, Nancy Pate, Waggoner Engineering, and Angela Stewart, shared updates and proposals on various community projects

One of the major agenda items was

the discussion and consideration of a concrete slab parking lot with line spaces versus a gravel parking lot for a commercial property. The Board also reviewed and approved a proposal from Drews Design and Construction to rework sheetrock, rehang and trim outdoor fixtures, and replace fluorescent lights for a total of \$3,965.

Additionally, the Board ratified an engagement letter with Novum Advisory PLLC and the City of Canton and considered an agreement with the Canton City Clerk and the Republican/Democrat Executive Committee, in accordance with Mississippi law.

Infrastructure improvements were a focal point, including the approval of a culvert repair and drainage damage project at 503 Harvey Watkins Drive due to water runoff erosion. The Board also authorized Waggoner Engineering to prepare a task order for addressing flooding issues on Cowan Street.

Election support was addressed with the Board's approval of an agreement for ES&S Election Systems & Software. They also approved a credit application to purchase chemicals through a purchase order

In the consent agenda, the Board approved funding for bands participating in the Black History Parade, allocating \$175 each to the Canton High School Band Booster and the Velma Jackson High School Band, and \$170 to the Lanier Band Boost-

The Board then moved into an executive session to discuss personnel matters across the Police Department, Building and Development Department, Fire Department, and Supervision and Finance. Discussions also covered potential litigation and negotiations regarding the prospective sale and lease of lands.

The next regular Board meeting is scheduled for March 18 at Canton City Hall.





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
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
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


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# Morton and Fleming named 2025 Mr. and Miss Basketball




# CHS varsity tigers named basketball state championship

When our little girl ran into the kitchen, eyes bright, dressed in pink Pokémon pajamas, she didn't run straight for the stuff. She didn't immediately rip into the presents to celebrate Pokémon Day. She ran straight to us. She wrapped her arms around us and told us thank you and Happy Pokemon Day.

So no, it wasn't too much. It was just enough. It was the perfect Beach Sand Moment.

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












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# **Canton student pages in MS House**


According to Bramuchi, "The

# Johnson from Canton Academy signs with MGCC




