# Nissan Foundation awards \$100K in grants to two Mississippi entities

Two Mississippi entities will each be the beneficiary of a \$50,000 grant awarded by the Nissan Foundation, part of a \$1.2 million grant program that provided funds to forty-four nonprofits who promote cultural understanding that leads to acceptance and appreciation of individuals' differences.

The Foundation for Mississippi History, "Two Mississippi Museums School Visits Program," and the GRAMMY Museum Mississippi, "Soul of the Movement Education Program," each received \$50,000 grants.

The total grant award is the most the Foundation has awarded in a single grant cycle. Grant recipients are based in communities surrounding Nissan facilities in Southern California, middle Tennessee, central Mississippi (Canton), Dallas/Ft. Worth, southeast Michigan, New York City, north central New Jersey and Atlanta.

The Nissan Foundation has awarded approximately \$17 million to more than one hundred fifty nonprofits since its founding in 1992. The Nissan Foundation was created as a direct response to the civil unrest that followed the Rodney King trial verdict. At that time, Nissan's then-U.S. sales headquarters was based just blocks from the riot's epicenter.

In the thirty-two years since the Nissan Foundation was created, it has helped organizations - big and small – develop and grow programming designed to increase understanding and acceptance of what makes us different," says Chandra Vasser, president of the Nissan Foundation and Nissan's first chief diversity, equity and inclusion officer. "It's an honor to uplift the important work of our grantees who are bettering our world by provid-ing safe spaces to explore our simi-larities while celebrating our differences.

The 2024 grantees include mobile education programs, museums, hislibraries, and other tory centers,

"I am thrilled that we're able to further the innovative programming of forty-four grantees this year,

said Ali Tonn, Nissan Foundation executive director. "These organizations are continually coming up with ways to reach new audiences and share the benefits of living and working together in a diverse soci-

The 2025 Nissan Foundation grant cycle will begin in October. Local

nonprofit organizations who are based in central Mississippi and who are working to bring diverse cultural perspectives, experiences and voices to communities across the country may be eligible to apply.

Applicants based in a Nissan affiliate market who can demonstrate that their programming increases understanding and acceptance of society's myriad cultural differences are invited to submit a Letter of Intent. Nissan will begin accepting those letters on October 1, 2024. All Letters of Intent must be received by 4 p.m. CST on November 4, 2024.

The Nissan Foundation will announce 2025 grantees in July 2025. Organizations invited to submit a full proposal are notified in January. Proposals are due in March, and awards are announced in June. Funded projects must be implemented no earlier than July and can run through June of the following year. # CPSD ready for new school year and exciting changes





"Invigorate! Innovate! Elevate!" was the call to action as the Canton Public School District welcomed back its staff to another exciting school year. Convocation 2024 was packed with excitement as CPSD Superintendent Gary Hannah made a historic announcement. The Canton Public School District is now the highest-paid school district in the State of Mississippi after offering its teachers, counselors, librarians, and interventionists a \$5,000 increase in the local supplement. Regardless of their experience, new teachers' starting salary will

be \$50,200. The district's original starting salary for teachers was \$45,200.

Across the board, over the last five years, all positions have received a 2% raise each year.

The cafeteria staff has gone from \$7.25 to \$14.00 per hour. That is over a 50 percent increase.

All cafeteria managers make at least \$30,000 a year.

All teacher assistants make over \$5,000 of the minimum the state requires. The State requirement is \$17,500. CPSD's minimum is \$22,500.

All teacher assistants' minimum is

\$24,000.

All school secretaries make a minimum of \$27,000.

All maintenance workers make a minimum of \$30,000.

All custodians make a minimum of \$14 per hour, double the minimum requirement set by the federal wage.

Bus drivers are outsourced.


CPSD has remained fiscally sound and maintained the state-required fund balance by implementing great fiscal practices and adhering to the board-approved budget.


CPSD has also made innovative improvements to its facilities and

grounds, adding artificial turf to the Tiger Stadium football field and updated HVAC systems. Moreover, the district is updating technology offerings for students and staff, including Chromebooks, Macbooks, and Promethean Boards. The district is also currently working on updating computer labs with new desktops.

### **MDAC** certifies Old Jail Farmers Market

Canton's Old Jail Farmers Market has been recognized by the Mississippi Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce Andy Gipson as a certified farmers market in Mississippi. It is the only certified farmers market in Madison county.

This year, the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce (MDAC) has certified thirty-two farmers markets in twenty-five counties as part of the Mississippi Certified Farmers Market Program. The program serves as a marketing initiative designed to identify and promote markets where producers of Mississippi grown produce and other agricultural products gather to sell their goods directly to consumers. Sales of food products that are grown, made or processed in Mississippi and sold from Certified Farmers Markets are exempt from sales tax.

"People today want the best when it comes to feeding their families," said Gipson. "And, because of that, many farmers markets around the state have been certified through our Mississippi Farmers Market Certification Program. With the certification, these markets are informing the public that they can find fresh, locally-grown produce, meats, eggs and other farm products near them."

In order to be recognized by the Mississippi Farmers Market Certification Program, local farmers markets must be identified and approved as locations where Mississippi farmers are gathered to sell their Mississippi grown produce and other agricultural products. By shopping at one of the state's certified markets, consumers can be confident that they are purchasing both fresh and nourishing food.

CPD covered several lessons with the Junior Cadets over the course of a week.


The Junior Cadets got a tour of the Madison County Detention Center and Canton Municipal Court.


Investigator Sergeant Gooden spoke

# Kylie Melons grows to become Kylie Melons Market

Most locals not only know Kylie Melons, but now use the corner store as a landmark in Canton. Owned by Kylie Warren, the name recently undersent a change and is now known as Kylie Melons Market.

In the summer of 2011, Warren and his family first began selling watermelons from the back of a pickup truck on the lot of Warren Used Cars. Since then, Kylie Melons Market has come a long way.

"In June of 2019, we officially began to add more produce to offer customers," remembers Warren. "We started with some tomatoes, peaches, and cantaloupes. It was also that summer that we set up our tents and displays in front of the current building in which we are now." "We then added Mama's Rice

"We then added Mama's Rice Krispy's, as well as her town favorite peanut brittle to the menu. Then came the plums, sweet corn, and fresh shelled peas and butterbeans."

That next month, Warren said, "we added a crowd favorite, the boiled peanuts! We were officially a road-side produce stand!"

That fall, with the purchase of their first cooler and the addition of mums, pumpkins and haybales, Warren said, "God opened the door

for us to begin growing. During the closed months, we added a new member to the family, as our first baby girl was born."

While many struggled during the pandemic, Warren said the business was blessed enough to continue to grow in both family members and products.

"With new paint, new produce tables, and a new look, we were now open on the inside of the building, as well. That year, 2020, was an exciting year for us, as we also added items from local vendors like lettuce, honey, salsas, pepper jellies, fresh baked breads, casseroles and more," he said.

As they continue to grow, the Warren family says they remain grateful to the citizens and visitors of Canton.

Warren explained that God's Word gives them the keys to success.

"These keys are like secrets, but even better. One thing we have learned is when you make His business your business, He will make His business your business. Matthew 6:33 King James Version says, 'But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

"All the success we've ever received is from Him. God's plans are greater than ours on our best day, and it's fun to trust Him," said Warren.

The market currently offers a bigger selection of fruits and vegetables as well as an array of assorted local products from casseroles, seafood, beef and pork to milk, ice cream, dips and homemade cakes and pies.

"Before each person comes into the store, whether they are frequent customers or first time guests, we would love for them to know how much we appreciate them," said Warren. "There's a wonderful feeling of thankfulness and gratitude that we have for all of our friends who chose us."

### ENJOY ONE LAST TASTY RECIPE WITH SUMMER'S JUICY TOMATOES

As the summer winds to a close, many will mourn the waning of the bounty of freshly grown tomatoes we got used to enjoying. Before the summer crop is gone, give this recipe a try. It can be used as an appetizer or even a main dish or a light lunch. It takes a little effort and preparation (the dough needs to chill about an hour), but the tender crust and flavor-filled center is worth it.

### SAVORY TOMATO PIE


### **INGREDIENTS:**

#### FOR THE CRUST:

- 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sour cream

#### FOR THE PIE:

- 4 medium tomatoes, peeled and cut into 1/2" thick slices (about 1 1/2 lb)
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3/4 cup mayonnaise (not reduced fat)
- 1 can crab meat, drained (not imitation) (approx. 1/2 cup)
- 3 green onions, chopped
- 2 Tblsp fresh basil, chopped
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese (not canned)
- 1 1/2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese



### PREPARATION:

#### FOR THE CRUST:

- 1. Stir together flour, baking powder and salt.
- 2. Cut shortening into flour mixture with a pastry blender or knife until mixture resembles small peas.
- 3. Add sour cream; stir with a fork or mix with hands until combined into a dough.
- 4. Shape dough into a flat disk.
- 5. Wrap in plastic wrap and chill one to twenty-four hours.

#### FOR THE PIE:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Place tomatoes in a single layer on paper towels. Sprinkle with salt and let stand for 20 minutes, then pat dry with paper towels.
- 3. Stir together mayonnaise, crab meat, green onions, basil and cheese, reserving 1/4 cup of the mozzarella cheese for later.
- 4. Roll sour cream dough into a large circle on a lightly floured surface. Put into a 9" pie plate, crimping edges.
- 5. Bake dough for 10 to 12 minutes until lightly brown. Remove from oven.
- 6. Sprinkle the remaining 1/4 cup of mozzarella cheese on top of the crust.
- 7. Arrange tomato slices over the cheese on the crust.
- 8. Spread mayonnaise mixture over tomatoes.
- 9. Bake at 350 degrees for 34 to 37 minutes, or until lightly browned on top.
- 10. Let cool at least five minutes before serving.

tool. I use Tik Tok and Instagram all the time to learn from and connect with other teachers. However, it can be used in the wrong ways, as well.



That experience has also allowed me to share a new perspective with my students, because I know what they are going through, and I can relate to how they feel when they open up their own phones. Who




